A lifelong "collector", Todd Fontaine, a man who is passionate in his quest for items that piece together a rich and vibrant history of the Metis people. A humble and gracious man with kind eyes that are generally glued to the ground beneath his feet around his property in the neighbourhood of Riding Mountain National Park in western Manitoba, Fontaine has uncovered astounding items that, to the average eye, would simply go unnoticed. Within this amazing collection, all of which has been catalogued in full every one of hundreds of arrow points, cutting tools, awls, heavy metal thimbles and needles for sewing leather, tanning/skinning equipment, coins, pipes, scraping tools, medicine pouches along with thousands of individual/unmatched beads of considerable size and intricate colour, padlocks, perfectly rounded stone weapons, coins, belts, buckles, doeskin beaded vests and jackets.....have a tiny white slash that bears a number written in black lettering - an ancient yet very efficient method of tracking each piece in the collection.
